Dear Families,


Easter falls later this year and Holy Week occurs in the first week of the holidays. In preparation for Easter it has become a tradition for our OLMC school community to mark this with 'God Day'.

God Day is a day that our students look forward to each year. They don't get a treat or have a mufti day. They take a deep dive into a piece of scripture relating to the Easter story. Their teachers guide them in deciphering the meaning of the text by learning about the context of the time when Jesus lived, finding out about the characters mentioned and looking at old maps of the Holy Land to gain a deeper understanding of the Scripture.

Once the children have unpacked the meaning of the text, they then look to make connections with their own life. They consider what is the lesson that will guide them in the choices they make or the actions they take. They also look to see how the messages connect with what might be happening in our world. After much discussion the children will write their own reflection to record their personal understanding of the Scripture and its connection to their personal situation.

Then comes the part everyone enjoys the most on God Day, creating an artistic representation or interpretation of the Scripture. The creativity of our children impresses me every year. Each child finds a unique perspective to represent in their painting, sculpture, drawing, model or actions. All of these wonderful creations form a display which becomes a part of our Easter Reflection walk. On the last days of school each class will walk around our school to stop and read each piece of scripture and pray together in preparation of their journey towards Easter.

Once again our parents will have the opportunity to participate in God Day remotely. Miss Magtanong has prepared some packs for parents to get creative and you are invited to attend a zoom session this afternoon to discuss the Scripture focus for the parents. 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COMPASS STUDENT REPORTS

Last week all student COMPASS reports were uploaded to the parent portal. This will allow parents to have easy access to all of their child/ren's reports since we rolled over to the COMPASS system. To access your child/ren's reports parents log into COMPASS, select their child, select 'Reports' on the top tool bar and choose the report you want to download. These can be downloaded on both mobile

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and desktop. Parents are reminded that only reports from 2021 or later will be available as this is when we began using the COMPASS system.

WINTER SCHOOL UNIFORM

Have you organised winter uniforms for your child/ren? *Have you updated your child's 2022 class on the app*? This update makes it easier to get the uniform order to the right class. All orders for uniforms should be placed using the Qkr app by 4pm on Tuesdays so that delivery can be made each Thursday. **The last day for ordering this term will be Tuesday 5 April**. Students wear their full winter uniform from the beginning of Term 2. Please check and ensure that all items are labelled with your child's name and it is still visible. If you purchased second hand uniforms you will need to add your child's name.

GIRLS

Tunic - School tartan tunic Blouse - Lemon long sleeved blouse with Peter Pan collar Tights or socks - Navy blue ankle or knee high socks or navy blue tights

Hair - Shoulder length or longer hair must be tied back. No hair colouring is permitted. Hair ties, ribbons and headbands must be yellow, navy blue or school uniform pattern.

BOYS

Trousers - Navy blue half elastic backed trousers Shirt - School blue long sleeve shirt with school crest Tie - striped school tie

Socks - Short grey school socks with blue/gold band **Hair** - Neat and simple haircuts that are graduated. <u>No</u> undercuts, number ones, rat tails or hair colouring, or visible lines for example. Hair shouldn't be longer than their shirt collar.

Jumper - Fleecy royal blue jumper or Wool/Nylon jumper - optional **Zip Jacket** - Royal blue with school crest (also part of the sports tracksuit)

During Term 1, we noticed that the hairstyles of some of our students do not match our school uniform policy. Girls are reminded that their hair should be tied back if it is longer than shoulder length. Our boys' haircuts should be blended and no shorter than a number 2, **without visible lines**. We appreciate parent support in ensuring haircuts are school appropriate as we move into Term 2.

We also noticed that some of our students have multiple layers under their school shirt (some up to 4 layers). All of our classrooms are air conditioned and comfortable. Having these multiple layers means your child may overheat and be unable to remove these layers. Think about how many layers you wear. It is enough for your child to wear a singlet, their school shirt, a jumper and or jacket. When your child is outside they are running and engaged in active play which keeps them warm enough.

HOMEWORK POLICY

YEARS

At Our Lady of Mt Carmel we believe that Homework provides a link between home and school. It allows families to connect with the classroom and to take an active role in the learning. Homework should be an *interactive experience that enhances family life* and is *manageable* for parents, teachers and students.

Homework involves an element of choice which enables students to evaluate and take responsibility for their learning. The homework assigned to students provides opportunities to:

- Consolidate classroom learning
- Develop a pattern of behaviour for lifelong learning beyond the classroom

- Involve family members in learning
- Lead a balanced lifestyle which includes sufficient time for family, recreation and cultural pursuits

The following table demonstrates the homework appropriate for particular phases of learning. It is important to note that the timing is a *general guide* for determining the amount of homework families might set out to achieve with their child.

Kindergarten	10 minutes a night	Daily reading is an expectation. Home readers will also be provided that are at a	
Year 1	15 minutes a night	family members where appropriate. Students are expected to work more independently. Daily and extended real	
Year 2	20 minutes a night		
Year 3	20 minutes a night		
Year 4-Year 6	30 minutes a night	is expected and is vital to build students' reading stamina. They are encouraged to practise mathematical concepts and complete a range of tasks that support learning across other areas of the curriculum e.g. History research task.	

So what does the research say about homework (with the exclusion of reading)? Six things that families need to know!

- There is no consistent evidence to show that homework lifts academic performance of primary aged students. Developmentally, they are not ready. They can't filter out irrelevant information or avoid environmental distractions – and if they struggle, the overall effect can be negative.
- Parent involvement with homework makes a considerable impact on a students' perception of learning and skill development. It has longer lasting effects than punitive consequences.
- There is no evidence that homework helps students develop time management skills.
- Homework should be purposeful and relevant and should not jeopardise the right of children to enjoy a balanced lifestyle.
- The quality of homework and effort spent on it is more important than the quantity and time spent.
- Unstructured playtime with siblings and parents is far more likely to develop social skills and creativity than
 most standardised homework tasks.
- Research supports the importance of regular home reading with extensive reading linked to superior performance on measures of general knowledge, vocabulary, spelling, verbal fluency and comprehension.

It is vital that families understand our position about homework. Our children participate in a full day of learning. In determining homework, we acknowledge that students are engaging in many different activities outside of school hours. These include a range of physical activities, sports, recreational, creative and cultural pursuits. Some students even have responsibilities as caregivers. Knowing this, having a punitive response towards homework would be counterproductive and not reflective of the role parents play in making decisions about what's right for their family. Families can expect to receive optional tasks, similar to the examples above, in which their children can engage with when it fits with their family lifestyle. At Our Lady of Mount Carmel we will not enforce any repercussions if students do not engage in homework. If families wish to enforce consequences we will support you in your decision as having clear guidelines and expectations is healthy for any family unit, however, there won't be any additional consequences at school.

The most useful homework of all is the learning that occurs during family interactions & shared experiences:

- Lots and lots of family conversation such as storytelling, jokes, family discussions, etc.
- Shared bedtime stories with a caring adult or family member reading to the children.
- Family games, activities and hobbies.
- Regular visits to the local library.
- Outings to all kinds of places of social, historic and natural interest.
- The kind of imaginative play that comes naturally to children of all ages.
