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#### PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear Families.

This Sunday marks the fourth Sunday of Lent. The Gospel reading this week tells the story of the miracle of Jesus healing the Blind Man. When Jesus saw the blind man, he spat on the ground to make a paste and then rubbed it over the man's eyes. Jesus then sent the man to the Pool of Siloam, a ritual bath, where he washed himself to find that his sight had been restored.

The man was then taken to the Pharisees who, being blinded by the laws of the Jewish rituals, failed to see Jesus as God, but saw him as a sinner because he had broken the laws of the Sabbath. The blind man in contrast saw the truth very clearly and rebuked the Pharisees because they failed to see the truth of Jesus before their very own eyes. The blind man, despite his physical blindness, was open to Jesus' actions and an encounter with Truth himself.







We all have blind spots in our thinking - an inner Pharisee - obscuring our understanding of the truth and of reality. Instead the truth we are capable of knowing is replaced with partial truths. because it would be uncomfortable to acknowledge the whole truth about ourselves, our mistakes or our circumstances. So we hide away from these truths and ignore the things we may need to address. When we do this we miss the opportunity to know the great truth of God's love for us and His desire to heal and to help us love God and all his people.


Let us consider:

In what ways have I been blind like the Pharisees? How can I be open to Jesus so as to see the love and light of God more clearly?

We do not set out on our days of vulnerability to encounter God, but he sets out to encounter us. This week, be attentive to situations where God might be trying to encounter you through prayer, other or nature.

Today our Year 3 and Year 5 children commence NAPLAN. Our children are well prepared and we encourage all families to remember that this testing is an indication of one point in time and does not represent the whole picture of our children as learners. Their NAPLAN results will not stop them from getting into high school or being successful individuals. We wish all our Year 3 and Year 5 children well.

#### SAFE PARKING - NO PARKING IN DRIVEWAYS

As parents of our school community we expect you to be safe and respectful when you are dropping off and picking up your child/ren from school. Recently there have been reports of unsafe, intimidating and disrespectful behaviour from some of our parents and carers. One of the main issues recently is parents and



carers who use the driveway outside the Bennett Street gate as a parking spot. Some parents pull into this space, between parked cars, or double park blocking traffic flow while their child 'quickly jumps out of/in' the car. This is unsafe and unacceptable behaviour from our parents and carers. The driveway is not a parking spot or drop off point. If you cannot safely park you need to drive around the block and try again. The example of your behaviour is observed by your child. We all need to be aware of the impact of our words and actions.

#### **WINTER UNIFORMS**

Families are encouraged to organise winter uniforms for their child/ren as early as possible. We are unable to provide try-on sizes at school but a size guide is at the end of this newsletter. All orders for uniforms should be placed using the Qkr app by 4pm on Tuesdays so that delivery can be made each Thursday. The last day for ordering this term will be Tuesday 4 April. Students must wear their winter uniform from the beginning of Term 2. Please update your child's 2023 class on the app.

#### **Parent Representative Council (PRC) Event**



# YEAR 3 SCIENCE INCURSION THE MATTER OF MATTER



In Science this term Year 3 students are learning about materials and the states of matter. They are learning to describe everyday examples of the changing states of matter. They are also learning about the scientific process where they will make predictions and observations during experiments.

To support their learning in Science students engaged in an incursion focusing on the states of matter. They participated in experiments by observing how adding and removing heat can cause changes in the states of matter.

Year 3 learnings from the incursion:

- Olivia, Kiara, Luke and Serah: The plasma ball was lots of fun and cool to touch!
- Emma and Sophie: We learnt that gas can melt and turn into plasma. We also learnt that electricity is a form of plasma.
  Ilia, Lachlan and Isabelle M and Isabelle T: We thought the dry ice
- Ilia, Lachlan and Isabelle M and Isabelle T: We thought the dry ice experiment was cool because you got see the reaction when the ice was dropped into the liquid and touch the bubbles.
- Kriti and Anaishca: We learnt what the states of matter are solid, liquid, gas and plasma
- Rishaan and Daniel: We really enjoyed seeing dry ice for the first time. We learnt that it is minus 78 degrees celsius which means you cannot touch it with your bare hands.

#### **HOMEWORK POLICY**

At Our Lady of Mt Carmel we believe that Homework provides a link between home and school. It allows families to connect with the classroom and to take an active role in the learning. Homework should be an *interactive experience* that enhances family life and is manageable for parents, teachers and students.

Homework involves an element of choice which enables students to evaluate and take responsibility for their learning. The homework assigned to students provides opportunities to:

- Consolidate classroom learning
- Develop a pattern of behaviour for lifelong learning beyond the classroom
- Involve family members in learning
- Lead a balanced lifestyle which includes sufficient time for family, recreation and cultural pursuits

The following table demonstrates the homework appropriate for particular phases of learning. It is important to note that the timing is a *general guide* for determining the amount of homework families might set out to achieve with their child.

Year 4-Year 6	30 minutes a night	is expected and is vital to build students' reading stamina. They are encourage to practise mathematical concepts and complete a range of tasks that support learning across other areas of the curriculum e.g. History research task.	

### So what does the research say about homework (with the exclusion of reading)? Six things that families need to know!

- There is no consistent evidence to show that homework lifts academic performance of primary aged students.
   Developmentally, they are not ready. They can't filter out irrelevant information or avoid environmental distractions and if they struggle, the overall effect can be negative.
- Parent involvement with homework makes a considerable impact on a students' perception of learning and skill development. It has longer lasting effects than punitive consequences.
- There is no evidence that homework helps students develop time management skills.
- Homework should be purposeful and relevant and should not jeopardise the right of children to enjoy a balanced lifestyle.
- The quality of homework and effort spent on it is more important than the quantity and time spent.
- Unstructured playtime with siblings and parents is far more likely to develop social skills and creativity than most standardised homework tasks.
- Research supports the importance of regular home reading with extensive reading linked to superior performance on measures of general knowledge, vocabulary, spelling, verbal fluency and comprehension.

It is vital that families understand our position about homework. Our children participate in a full day of learning. In determining homework, we acknowledge that students are engaging in many different activities outside of school hours. These include a range of physical activities, sports, recreational, creative and cultural pursuits. Some students even have responsibilities as caregivers. Knowing this, having a punitive response towards homework would be counterproductive and not reflective of the role parents play in making decisions about what's right for their family. Families can expect to receive optional tasks, similar to the examples above, in which their children can engage with when it fits with their family lifestyle. At Our Lady of Mount Carmel we will not enforce any repercussions if students do not engage in homework. If families wish to enforce consequences we will support you in your decision as having clear guidelines and expectations is healthy for any family unit, however, there won't be any additional consequences at school.

The most useful homework of all is the learning that occurs during family interactions & shared experiences:

- Lots and lots of family conversation such as storytelling, jokes, family discussions, etc.
- Shared bedtime stories with a caring adult or family member reading to the children.
- Family games, activities and hobbies.
- Regular visits to the local library.
- Outings to all kinds of places of social, historic and natural interest.
- The kind of imaginative play that comes naturally to children of all ages.
