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PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear Families.

Our membership of this learning community has a shared central focus - the best interests of the children in our school. We are all working towards helping each child to be their best self as a - learner, friend, spiritual person, family member, citizen and individual.

As we work with you to shape these precious little people we know that they are humans who make mistakes. Sometimes their mistakes are small ones and sometimes they are big ones. Some mistakes surprise us because they are out of character for a particular child. The bottom line is that sometimes, given a specific set of circumstances all children, even the best behaved, are capable of making really poor decisions or behaviour choices. I'm sure we can all think back to our school days and recall one instance where you made a really dumb choice that got you into lots of trouble, I know I can.

As teachers, we have a responsibility to share with you, as parents, the good things your child has done and the not so good things. Your children don't want to upset you, and know you may be upset if they make a mistake or poor choice that their teacher has to share with you. We don't enjoy having to share bad news with you, but we do so, because you have the right to know and we want your child to be the best person they can be. We want to work with you to help your child identify and take responsibility for their mistake, help make things right or fix the problem and help them prevent a repeat of the mistake.

In recent weeks, I know that some of my staff have been in touch with parents to share news of the mistakes or poor choices some children have made. There have been some conversations that were not examples of adults being their best selves or taking the conversation in the spirit it was intended. When we have to have these conversations I ask all people involved - parents and staff alike - to enter the conversation seeking to understand the situation. This requires all people to listen and speak respectfully to each other. When a teacher has a conversation with a parent they are doing so because they care about your child, they are sharing their expert perspective as educators who know their work. If a teacher is relaying information about a particular situation between children, they are doing so after an investigation with all involved. They are giving you an objective

assessment and may seek your perspective to understand any underlying issues we may not be aware of. If a conversation becomes very emotionally charged or disrespectful it will be stopped and rescheduled for a time when everyone has had the opportunity to calm down. Our guiding principle is The Community of OLMC is Safe and Respectful, you have heard me say it many times, this means you and me, our teachers and children. We won't always agree, but we can do so respectfully. Let's endeavour to enter each conversation with open minds ready to listen and seeking to understand.

From this coming Friday, I will be taking a short period of leave for a week to travel to a family wedding. During my absence Mrs Anderiesz will take on the role of Acting Principal. I am sure you will all ensure it is a calm week and look after her!

SICKNESS AT SCHOOL

As with the wider community, we are also experiencing another increase in COVID, flu and colds amongst the staff and students. Over the past three weeks we have had to send numerous children home before 10am because they are too unwell to learn. Sick children attending school impacts the health of other students and staff. Staff who fall ill aren't able to come to work, which means your child doesn't have their regular teacher and regular learning. The following is a reminder for parents:

- 1. If your child is sick with flu-like symptoms, please keep them at home until they are well
- 2. If your child test positive for COVID, you are invited to contact the school to inform us of the diagnosis
- 3. If your child presents with flu-like symptoms during the school day, the office staff will contact you and your child will be sent home

Although we can not control the spread of flu and colds, we can put in preventative measures to reduce the spread. As you know through news coverage last week, several schools have had to revert to online learning due to significant increases in staff and student absences due to COVID. While we understand it can be a challenge to arrange care for sick children, and may even require an adult to stay home from work, this is the least that we can all do to prevent us from reverting back to online learning.
