
For our school community the start of Term 3 is made extra special by the celebration of our feast day. This year we celebrated our Feast Day with a whole school Mass on the first day of term. This week the children are also engaging with learning to deepen their knowledge of Our Lady of Mount Carmel and the traditions and significant people associated with our Carmelite community. The children will be learning about these significant association:



The Prophet Elijah - Elijah is a minor prophet in the Old Testament, he was alive around 900 BC for a period of some 50-60 years. Elijah means "My Lord is Yahweh". The story of Elijah can be found in the first Book of Kings, Chapters 1 and 2. In the New testament at the Transfiguration of Jesus on Mt Tabor, Elijah and Moses were also present. Elijah as a connection with the Word of God, Moses as a connection with the Law of God and Jesus as the new covenant promised as Messiah. Elijah used the caves on Mt Carmel to live in and pray in. Elijah is the major patron of the Carmelite Order.

Mount Carmel - Mount Carmel is a well known ridge in Palestine. Mount Carmel is not mentioned in the New Testament but is often referenced in the Old Testament. There are many caves in the Carmel Range and these caves were used by hermits to become closer to God. Today Mt Carmel rises above the modern city of Haifa, the Church of Stella Maris sits atop the mountain and inside the Church is one of the caves believed to be where Elijah prayed. About ten minutes away are the ruins of a 12th century Carmelite monastery.





Carmelite Saints - St Titus Brandsma - was born in the Netherlands in 1881. He is the most recent Carmelite saint and was canonised as a martyr in May 2022. During the second world war he was openly critical of Nazi ideology and what was occuring. He defended the freedom of the Catholic press. He was arrested and sent to Dachau concentration camp where he was executed.

St Simon Stock - was born 1165 in England. It is said that when he was twelve years old he began to live as a hermit in the hollow trunk of an oak and later to have become an itinerant preacher until he entered the Carmelite Order which had just come to England. Under the leadership of St Simon Stock the Carmelite Order had significant growth across Europe. Mary, the Mother of God appeared to St Simon Stock and gave him the brown scapular to increase devotion to Her Son across the world.

The Brown Scapular - the brown scapular is a part of our rich Catholic tradition. It is a sign of the devotion of Carmelites to Our Lady of Mount Carmel and her Son; and it is a sign of Our Lady of Mount Carmel's love for and protection of the order that honours her as sister, mother, and queen. The brown scapular is worn under our clothing as a personal act of devotion.

During this special week, we particularly ask Our Lady of Mount Carmel to guide us in all we do to honour our God.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE - EVERY DAY COUNTS

Regular school attendance is an important factor in helping our children to be successful learners and build strong friendships within their peer group. Good attendance patterns established in primary school carry over into high school.

Students who attend school regularly are away less than five days a term or twenty days over a year. Absences can quickly add up, without realising it. There are usually very valid reasons for student absences and the terms over the Winter period are ones where we normally see student attendance dip due to illness. It is important to be aware of absences to prevent negative impacts academically and socially for the children.



At the end of Term 2 our student attendance rate was 76%. We are aiming for regular attendance for all of our students, which would be an attendance rate of 90% or higher. Let's work together - parents, students and staff - to improve our attendance rates.

A HISTORIAN IN OUR MIDST



On the 31st of March, Cumberland Council workers visited our year six students. They explained their jobs in the council and how they made changes to the Cumberland area. They encouraged students to participate in various competitions. One of our students,

CHILD PROTECTION MATTERS FOR PARENTS

Each term we run a Child Protection Briefing for our parents who would like to help out at school. The key messages we share during these sessions are important for all of our parents to know.

- We all have a responsibility to ensure that all children are safe and work to reduce the risk of harm.
- When your child enters our school grounds each day, their teachers take over the duty of care from you.
- Any problems, misbehaviour or issues that occur between children will be managed by school staff. NO PARENT IS
 ALLOWED TO APPROACH ANOTHER CHILD TO REPRIMAND THEM. If you observe a problem or your child
 reports a problem, you must report it to a staff member for them to deal with.
- If a child discloses something concerning, your should report it to their teacher, who will follow our system protocols as mandatory reporters.
- The privacy and confidentiality for each child and staff member is paramount. Student behaviours and learning needs should not be discussed with other parents.

We always advise parents that before they step in to handle a situation on their child's behalf to consider 'how you would feel if another parent did this to your child.' You are your child's advocate and rightly so, however the school grounds are a safe place for all the children and when a parent approaches another child, no matter how well meaning, the child always feels intimidated or threatened. Oftentimes when parents don't allow staff to manage student problems the result is broken parent friendships. Some problems between children take a longer time to resolve as we work with children to understand the causes and change habits and behaviours. This also requires patient and respectful support from parents.

HAVE YOU THOUGHT ABOUT LETTING YOUR CHILD CATCH A BUS TO SCHOOL?

I know that many of our families feel frustrated at drop off and pick-up times. Parents waiting in queued traffic, losing patience with those who don't do the right thing. Did you know that a way to reduce this stress in your life is considering the use of school buses. We have a number of school buses that our families can access in the morning and afternoon. Primary school students are eligible to apply for a School Opal Card For children in K-2 there is no distance limit, for children in Yrs 3-6, the minimum distance is 1.6km straight line or 2.9KM walking. If you decide to give the bus a go, get in touch with the school and we will support your child and you through the process. Catching the bus is a great way for children to build their independence and resilience in a safe environment. The school buses listed below are not public bus routes, but school specific.
