PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear Families,

On Monday, I had the pleasure of taking the children from the OLMC Concert Band to a Primary Band Exhibition as a part of Captivate's 2023 Arts Factor program. There were approximately 200 children who were in 12 Bands from primary schools across our Diocese coming together to perform prepared pieces for each other. We even saw three former OLMC students who now attend Marist support one of the bands. The children joined their band leader on the stage at Nagle College with a mix of excitement and nerves. For many of our children this was the first time they performed in front of an audience on stage. After each individual band performed, all the students created a giant band to play a piece of music called Samba Time.

As I watched our children perform I was so impressed with how far they had come in mastering their instrument. They all demonstrated commitment and persistence in practising their pieces. I have heard them practise as a band every Wednesday afternoon since the beginning of the year.

Learning to play and practise an instrument is a solitary task. Each learner has differing skill levels and rates of mastery. As you play on your own you can follow your own lead. When playing in a band the focus shifts from the individual to the group. Band members need to share the limelight, they need to listen to each other to stay in time and respond to their conductor.

Being a part of the band is a truly collaborative exercise. There are many skills our students develop being a part of a band that are applicable to their daily lives:

- Regular Practise is required to master their skills
- Being Persistent to keep trying until you find the right answer
- Working Collaboratively with other people
- Listening to hear other people
- Adjusting your actions to make the group work smoothly
- Accepting Feedback and Direction to improve your performance
- Evaluating your efforts to determine how successful you were

The Concert Band will perform their pieces at the morning Assembly on Monday 4 September (Week 8). Stay tuned for details of a Band Concert Night next term, in the meantime have a look at our Facebook Page to see a video of the OLMC Concert Band's Performance.

At the end of this week, I will be taking a period of leave for the remainder of the term. During my absence Mrs Anderiesz will be Acting Principal, Mrs Diaz will be Acting Assistant Principal and Mrs Stevenson will be Acting Religious Education Coordinator. I am sure that our community will respectfully support our leadership team and all of our staff as you always do. I look forward to seeing you all at the start of Term 4.

ABSENCE NOTIFICATIONS

Student absences are a part of life at school. When your child is away you are required to notify the school of their absence and the reason for the absence. We know that parents lead busy lives but there are a few simple ways to notify the school.

- 1. Use the COMPASS parent portal to submit your child's absence make sure you put the time until 3:15pm for whole day absences
- 2. Phone the office and leave a message with the office staff
- 3. Send an email to your child's teacher or the school office
- 4. Write a note for your child to give to their teacher when they return

Sometimes you will receive a letter from the school seeking an explanation for part-day or full-day absences, please complete these and return them to school the next day, even if you thought you sent a notification in, sometimes they don't always save correctly.

NATIONAL CHILD PROTECTION WEEK

National Child Protection Week is happening across Australia from Sunday 3 to Saturday 9 September 2023. It's an opportunity to recognise and promote the safety and wellbeing of Australian children with the message that 'Every child, in every community, needs a fair go'. This message is complemented by the theme 'Where we start matters'. Where we start our lives in terms of where we live, the resources available to us, and the opportunities presented to us, make a significant difference to our life outcomes. Institutions where young people are highly visible, schools, Parishes, sporting facilities etc, have a significant responsibility to ensure the safety of all, reduce current of future risks and promote further community awareness through working collectively to change the trajectory of children and families who are at greater risk. As part of our System's strategy to build child safe communities, 10 Child Safe Standards are constantly reviewed, updated and shared with key stakeholders to ensure everyone understands their role in contributing to a culture of child safety. Standard 5: People working with children are suitable and supported and Standard 6: Processes to respond to complaints of child abuse are attached below. We would also encourage families to view the 3 key posters that all classrooms will discuss leading up to Child Protection Week which focus on 'Body Safety Rules', 'Feelings' and 'Early Warning Signs'.

Over the next three weeks some of our students will engage in the English (Wk5) Science (Wk6) and Mathematics (Wk7) ICAS





BULLYING NO WAY!

National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence Friday 18 August 2023

On Friday 18th August, the OLMC community participated in the National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence.

The 2023 theme 'Growing Connections' highlights the importance of a sense of belonging and connectedness to support student social and emotional wellbeing and the prevention of bullying

Year 4 explored:

What bullying is...& is not We researched and shared ideas on what is considered bullying and what is not. Connection Tree

We looked at different communities that we belong to and brainstormed all of our trust networks that we can go to in times of need.

Year 4 Bullying Pledge

As a class, we created a pledge to describe the correct way to treat each other.

Team Building Activities

We played Capture the Ball and had so much fun learning to cooperate and work as a team to achieve a goal.

Year 4's Key Messages:

There are different forms of bullying including:

-Verbal: name calling, insults, threats

-Physical: hurting, intimidating, stealing, damaging property. -Social: consistently excluding another person or sharing information, images or other digital content that will have a harmful effect on the other person.

Steps to respond to bullying:

Talk to someone about it & seek help.



Try a few of the strategies: Ignore the action or person and walk away.

Act unimpressed or pretend you don't care what they say or do to you. Use strong, assertive statements, starting with the word 'l';

Use 'fogging' which means making a joking or funny comment that makes the other person think you don't care about what they say. Ask someone to speak up for you.

Try to stay positive. Hang around with your friends and be with people who help you feel good about yourself.

It's important to tell a trusted adult if you're being bullied. Everyone deserves to be treated with kindness and

respect.

STANDARD 5: PEOPLE WORKING WITH CHILDREN ARE SUITABLE AND SUPPORTED

Aim: Organisations attract, recruit, supervise and support staff to keep children safe.



What should CSPD be doing?

- Advertising for and screening of new employees emphasises child safety.
- Relevant probity checks conducted on staff.
- New staff receive an induction and all staff are made aware of their reporting obligations and child safety responsibilities.

Why is this Standard important?

Screening processes, including the WWCC, help prevent unsuitable candidates from being employed.

Comprehensive human resource practices ensure staff receive ongoing training to perform their role effectively.

 People management and supervision have a child safety focus.

- Rigorous recruitment and screening processes include compulsory WWCC, reference checks, including child protection screening questions and checks.
- WWCC Renewal and verification processes.
- All Staff are required to complete Safeguarding onboarding and

mandatory annual Safeguarding training.

- Building Child Safe Communities (BCSC) processes implemented to ensure all volunteers and contractors complete the BCSC form and learning module.
- Appropriate responses to concerns about staff

performance in relation to codes, policies and procedures.

- CSPD WWCC Policy
- Support, mentoring and probation periods for new staff and volunteers.
- Teacher accreditation and teaching standards include safeguarding.

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STANDARD 6

Processes to respond to complaints of child abuse are child focused

Aim: Children are the priority when responding to complaints of abuse

Why is this standard important?

Implementing a child focused complaint handling procedure means people know how to make a complaint and staff know what steps to take to respond.

Children are safer when complaints are addressed quickly, thoroughly and transparently, and where the family and community are supported. When the complaint process is child focused, children feel more comfortable and empowered to make a complaint.

Child safe organisations use complaints as opportunities to reflect on their child safe practices. Children are at greater risk when organisations prioritise their own reputations over the safety of children.

What should we be doing?

• The organisation has a child focused complaint handling system

that is understood by children, staff, volunteers and families.

- The organisation has an effective complaint handling policy that clearly outlines roles and responsibilities, approaches to dealing with different types of complaints, and obligations to act and report.
- Complaints are taken seriously and responded to promptly and thoroughly.
- The organisation meets reporting, privacy and employment obligations.

- CSPD's Safeguarding Procedures, Code of Conduct and Code of Conduct for Working With Children and Students.
- · Responds to complaints and/or allegations raised in relation to children or students.
- Records and follows reporting requirements of the Office of the Children's Guardian (OCG), NSW Police (NSWP) and the Joint Child Protection Response Program (JCPRP) and Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ).
- Fosters strong relationships with external agencies and proactively networks with the OCG, NSWP and JCPRP to ensure quality and regular review of CSPD policy and procedures.
- · Stringent record keeping practices in line with Privacy and legislative requirements.
- CSPD Wellbeing team including Student Wellbeing Counsellors at all CSPD schools to support students and adhere to mandatory reporting obligations.
- Annual mandatory training requirements for all employees in respect of their legal responsibilities related to child protection, mandatory reporting and other relevant school expectations.

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10 Body Safety Rules



- Teach children the correct names of their body parts.
- Explain that our private body parts are those under our bathing suit (also include the mouth)
- Instruct that no-one can touch your private body parts or show you pictures of private body parts.
- Explain you must never touch another person's private body parts even if an older child or adult asks you to.
- 5 Discuss Early Warning Signs, i.e. sweaty palms, racing heart, sick tummy; always act on your early warning signs.

- You can shout, "Stop" or "No!" (hand help out) if touched on your private body parts.
- Tell a trusted adult straightaway if you are: touched on your private body parts, shown pictures of private body parts, or your Early Warning Signs kick in.
- Keep on telling until you are believed.
- Never keep secrets that make you feel uncomfortable or unsafe.
