PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear Families,


This Sunday our Gospel reading Matthew 18:15-20 will provide valuable guidance on conflict resolution within the Christian community. Jesus wants the relationships between Christians to be the kind of love and loyalty and dedication we see in our own families. Jesus, our greatest example of what God wishes for us to be, gives a guide to what conflict resolution looks, sounds and feels like at school and in the home.

Verse 15: "If your brother or sister sins, go and point out their fault, just between the two of you. If they listen to you, you have won them over."

As educators and parents, it's our responsibility to guide and teach our children in the ways of righteousness. When our children make mistakes or misbehave, it's important to approach them with love and with the understanding that they are on the same journey we were on, all those years ago. We do this by taking the time to have a private and gentle conversation, share our concerns, offer guidance, and listen to their perspective.

Verse 16: "But if they will not listen, take one or two others along, so that 'every matter may be established by the testimony of two or three witnesses."

If the initial conversations with our children don't lead to resolution, we may consider involving other trusted educators, family members or mentors who can provide guidance and support. Sometimes, a different perspective or the presence of additional people can help resolve conflicts more effectively.



There may be times when our children continue to disobey or engage in harmful behaviour despite our efforts. In such cases, it is vital to remember that we live in community where

support can be found through our religious community. However, even in the face of persistent challenges, a loving and supportive attitude is maintained, just as Jesus did with tax collectors and sinners.

Verses 18-20: "Truly I tell you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven...For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them."

These verses emphasise the power of prayer and unity within our Christian community. We should always seek God's guidance to support us in our journey. There is strength and assurance in knowing that He is with our children and with us, as we no doubt ask for wisdom, patience, and understanding along the way.

As parents and educators we take lead from Jesus' teachings to approach conflicts within the our community with love, understanding, and a commitment to resolution. Whether it is our family unit, friendship group or the school setting, we need to seek support when needed, maintain a spirit of love and forgiveness, and remember the power of prayer and unity in this journey of forming people for mission.

PARENTS REQUIRING SUPPORT & CHILD PROTECTION REMINDERS

There will be a moment (many in fact), in every families journey through school that things won't be going as we hoped for and parents will need the support of 'The Team'. An important aspect of working as a team is knowing the roles of each member and who to approach for help. Just like any organisation, we have systems in place to ensure parents receive the most accurate information and appropriate support.

- Any issues regarding your child need to be directed to your child's classroom teacher FIRST, as they are best placed to discuss any concerns. Any emails that are directed to Mrs Anderiesz or Miss Pirovic will be redirected to the classroom teacher, as they are best placed to understand your concerns.
- 2. Each Stage of learning has a coordinator. Coordinators deal with ongoing or major issues. Parents might request a meeting with a Stage Coordinator AFTER they have spoken with the classroom teacher and still seek further support.
- 3. In serious cases, Stage Coordinators will direct issues to myself or Miss Pirovic. Parents can also request a meeting with us AFTER they have communicated with the classroom teacher and Stage Coordinator.

Please respect this process to ensure you promptly receive the most accurate information about any concerns you may have. This process also allows us to initiate our policies and procedures to ensure all families and students receive a fair opportunity to be heard. Allowing the school to impartially deal with issues, demonstrates respect to the different parenting styles of all families within our community and ensures consistency of procedure.

No parent is to approach another parent and <u>approaching a child is never acceptable</u>. This is such a serious matter that it falls within the Government's Child Protection legislation around Working with Children. Consider how you would feel if a parent questioned, or made your child feel under pressure or afraid. Any parent found to be engaging in this behaviour will forfeit their place on any future excursions or volunteer activities.

PICK UP IDEAS

Whether we consider it or not, driving is one of the very few actions we do, which requires us to think about 'community'. I really can't think of another activity, that we do so often, where our actions need to be reflective of 'the greater good'. Consider a driver who has blocked an intersection or roundabout, with all oncoming traffic now at a standstill, we all just think 'seriously, are you joking'! (and many other words I'm sure). Well this happens everyday at OLMC. Last week a concerned parent raised a few issues relating to the traffic situation during pick up time. It seems that traffic is at a standstill on Station Street, because the drivers on Bennett Street are not moving. This is causing other drivers to become very frustrated and impatient, some even driving on the wrong side of the road to pass the blockade of cars. We may not be able to control the driving habits of 'other' drivers, but we can shift our mindset to 'the greater good' to ease the traffic situation.



We regularly share this in the newsletter, but as a reminder, parents are asked to keep moving unless they can drive straight into a car spot. KEEP MOVING! I understand that this may mean ANOTHER round of the block, which is frustrating, however, let's be realistic, any location where 300 cars are attempting to come and go in a 15 minute window is going to be hectic, we are not going to avoid that.

So what can we do in the short term,

- 1. **KEEP MOVING.** A park will become available.
- 2. **FURTHER IS QUICKER**. Park on parallel roads to the school and walk. I know of parents who park near the medical centre in Wentworthville and walk. They are in and out guicker than those who decide to circle for 10 minutes.
- 3. **SPREAD OUT THE TIME**. Be mindful of the time you can collect your child. The gates open at 3:10pm and dismissal continues until 3:30pm. So come later. At 3:25 you could drive straight up to the gate without any hassles.
- 4. **WALK THROUGH THE SCHOOL**. While we have one pick up area, parents can still walk through the school using the Smith St gate/COSCH Gate. Sometimes this gate is opened slightly later, especially if the front gate is opened earlier, the COSCH gate will not be opened earlier and this is because it is not supervised.

However, we are always open to suggestions on how we can improve the situation and encourage any parent with realistic suggestions to email Mrs Anderiesz for discernment.

SUMMER UNIFORM

All students will be required to wear their Summer uniform from the start of Term 4. As the weather begins to warm children have the option to wear either their **full** Summer uniform or their **full** Winter uniform, not a combination of both.

The Voice of Youth is an annual competition that has been held at the Parramatta Diocese for the past 36 years. It involves all Year 6 students across the 60+ Western Sydney Catholic schools.

Contestants select a topic that is important to them that they wish to present. The topic may deal with any number of deep issues or topics pertinent to the world in which we live. Contestants are then required to prepare and deliver a prepared speech. It is a wonderful opportunity for young people to develop skills in planning, research and organisation - skills which are all needed in the modern world.
